Pattern with Social Stereotypes



- Pattern with Social Stereotypes
 - Equate ways of speaking (dialects, languages, voices) with certain social groups



- Pattern with Social Stereotypes
 - Equate voices with social groups
- Black voices sound aggressive or lazy



- Pattern with Social Stereotypes
 - > Equate voices with social groups
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- Pattern with Social Stereotypes
 - Equate voices with social groups
- Black voices sound aggressive or lazy
- Female voices sound shrill, pitchy, creaky
- Southern voices sound uneducated or slow-paced
- New England voices sound fast-paced, confident to-a-fault



Legally, Discrimination is an act which must occur in physical proximity.

We Know

(Ask me later about these studies later; sources linked!)

- We pull social information out of a voice early and reliably
 - ➤ ("Hello")
- We use that information to make social judgments about other people
 - > Age, Race, Gender
- Sometimes our judgments are so strong that we hear things that aren't even there!
 - Canadianness







The Idea

- Curated images of thriving, Black life in Detroit splashed across the structures that have supplanted it.
- Allow the viewer to observe as the culture erodes around them over time.
