- ❖ Piece of paper for answers
 - Either CANADIAN or MICHIGAN written at the top.

- ❖ Same system that lets us constantly hear the spaces between words

Linguistic Discrimination

- ❖ Co-opt the categorical perception system
- ❖ Same system that lets us constantly hear the spaces between words
- ❖ Also convinces us that a person is ignorant when they say *aks* instead of *ask*



respectively.

How many voices? 97% identified three distinct speakers

- ❖ National Survey of Rental Professionals (target listeners)
- ❖ “Be **well spoken** and considerate on the phone”
 - Speaking MUSE is like putting a business suit on your voice.

Taken Together

Preliminary Results

- ❖ We can begin to understand how if **AAL sounds poorer**, and people hear AAL 89% of the time I talk like my family, how this affects **my chances of finding a home** in whatever neighborhood I can afford.

Quick Review

What we know now.

(ask me about the ongoing study later)

- ❖ 190 years of racialized housing discrimination
- ❖ People accurately **hear** social information
- ❖ People make judgements based on voice alone
- ❖ Property owners **care** about how you sound

This Matters.

Homeownership

 - Generational Wealth
 - Determines Tax Base
 - In turn determines school district funding
 - Which in turn determines individual social mobility.

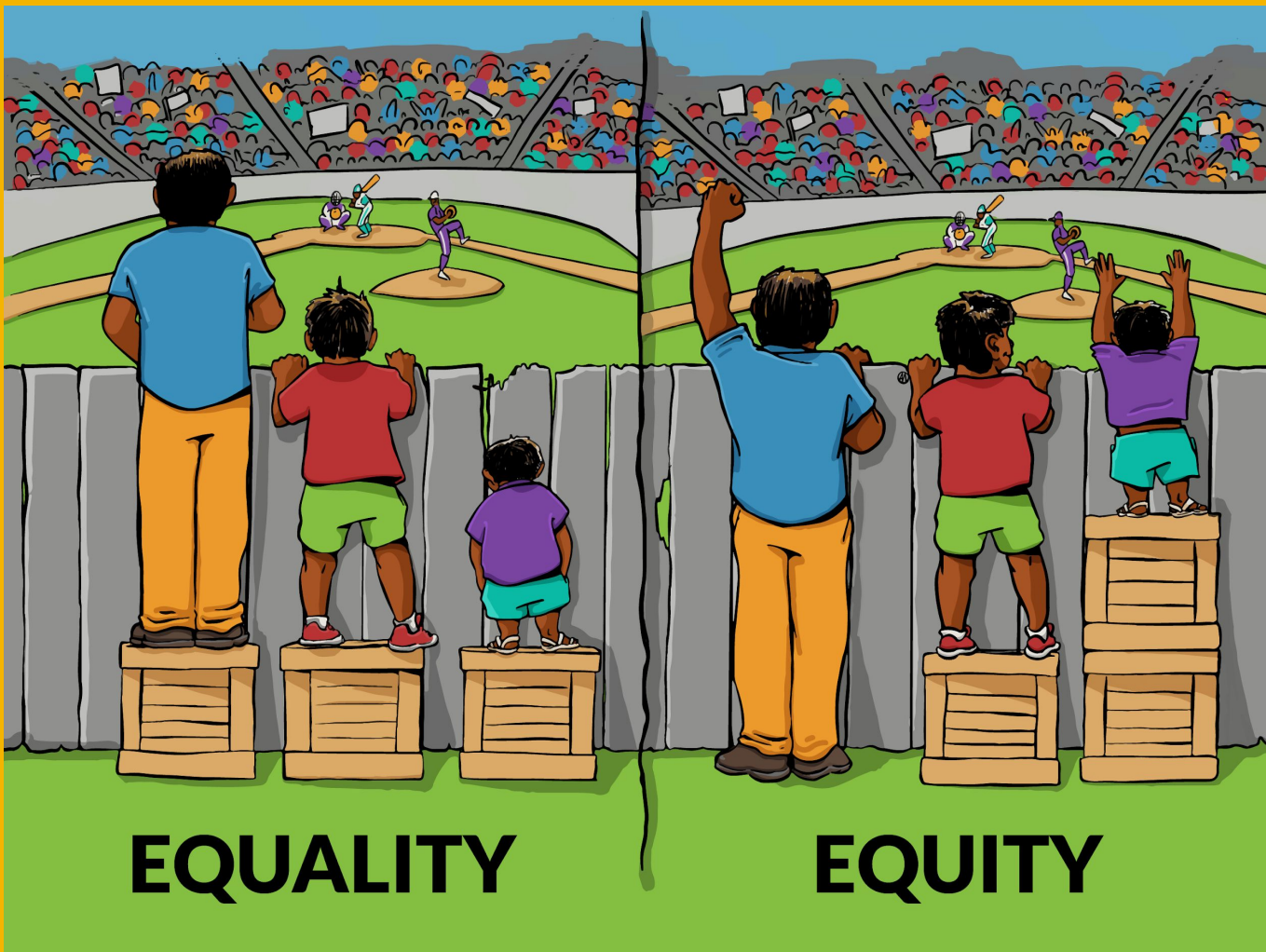
